







His kindness and warmth attracted me to him from the very beginning, and they still do! He is a generous and kind person who values his relationships with others.


Steve recently completed his Master's degree in Education and his teaching credential to teach high school English. He previously was a manager and administrator of human services programs that support adults with developmental disabilities.






Our Home








We live in a relatively new 3 bedroom, 2 bathroom family home in a very safe and quiet neighborhood. The house has a large great room that connects the living room to the dining room. We also have a family room and breakfast nook next to the kitchen. We have a great yard with plenty of space for games and activities.

We live in the suburbs in a very nice neighborhood near a large mountain reserve. While we are in the suburbs, we are only about 10 miles away from the downtown area and easily access cultural, educational, and sporting events/opportunities.

Our neighborhood is economically stable and ethnically and culturally diverse. Our neighborhood boasts some of the best schools in the entire metropolitan area and is a desirable location for families. We are members of the community center that has a swimming pool, tennis courts, and dance and gymnastics classes. We live within walking distance of two very nice parks with large play areas for young children. It is a great place to raise children, which is why we moved here.



Our Future



We plan to stay where we are, particularly while our children are young. We are happy here and have a nice life and network of friends and supports. Steve is transitioning to a new career as a high school English teacher so we plan to focus on helping him get established. Elizabeth is in a good point in her career to slow down and take time off so she plans to stay at home with our next child.

We were both raised in Christian households. We believe in the basic values and way of living from the Bible and our faith. We attend an African Methodist Episcopal church (AME), a congregation and community of wonderful, social justice and service-minded people. This congregation is almost entirely African American and, while it was a little uncomfortable at first for us to be one of the (if not the) only white people attending, we feel like it is so good for our biracial family and really a good experience for us to see what it might feel like for Tessa in situations in life when she is the only black person. We try to minimize these occurrences by living and engaging in a diverse community, but it still happens. Our family has been embraced and welcomed at our church, and we are so grateful for such a warm and loving church community.

We want to raise our children to be critical thinkers and to examine faith in her/his own way, not from a rigid set of guidelines.

We plan to send our children to the best schools we can find for their specific needs and strengths. In the case of our daughter, she attends a Montessori school and will stay there until we believe a change is needed. Fortunately, we have access to good schools in our neighborhood and other charter and private school options nearby should our children have specialized interests. There are some excellent preparatory schools and art, science, and technology magnet schools downtown.

We plan to strongly encourage a college education and will financially support our children to attend college. We are both educators, and we see the value in higher education and even graduate training. However, we also know that there are other viable paths to a successful career in the arts or other professions. If our child is undecided about her/his path, we would encourage a good liberal arts education either way since it provides character growth and personal development in addition to vocational opportunities. With Elizabeth as a professor, our children can receive free tuition to attend the university where she teaches or either of the other 2 public universities in the state. But we would also support a different university or vocational choice if that was the best thing for our child and well-planned.

We are very excited about our plans to expand our family once again through adoption. We have chosen to pursue the adoption of an African American child partially because of our daughter's Ethiopian heritage. We feel like all that we have learned as we have worked diligently to honor and embrace our daughter's heritage as part of our family's heritage and our way of life, has made us well equipped to raise an African American child. We want you to know that we are dedicated to making sure that our children live and engage in an ethnically diverse community, and that we as a biracial family celebrate each child's heritage.

If you should chose us to parent your child, we want you to know that you will be honored in our family. We would love to hear about your hopes and dreams for this child. We would love to hear about any traditions and cultural issues that are important to you, things you want your child to experience and learn one day. Who you are will be reflected in your child, and that is incredibly important to us.

We are praying for you and trusting God to speak to your heart in a real way about your child's future.
